



IDENTITY IS MY RIGHT TO BE ME

Did you know that all children have rights?

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child is an agreement to protect children's rights - ratified (signed up to) by more countries around the world than any other human rights treaty! Aotearoa is one of those countries which means our government has an obligation to ensure these rights are fulfilled for all children under 18 across the motu (country).





Identity is one of your rights!

There are **54 rights** included in the convention.

These are all based on what children need to survive, grow, participate and reach their potential! **Articles 7 and 8** are the specific ones that talk about the right to identity and that the Government has to respect your right to your name, nationality and family.



 - Because ...
 - Things that came to mind as I read this poem were ...
 - Were there any questions you had or words you weren't sure about?
 - What mood did the poem leave you in?

Extra wero (challenges):

- Take the title of the poem: Identity is my right to be me and create your own poem in response
- Create an illustration or set of illustrations that show how this poem connects with your own identity
- Write your own poem about one of the other rights of the child (see our Children's Rights handout to read the full list)
