The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child is an agreement to protect children's rights - ratified (signed up to) by more countries around the world than any other human rights treaty! Aotearoa is one of those countries which means our government has an obligation to ensure these rights are fulfilled for all children under 18 across the motu (country).





### Identity is one of your rights!

There are **54 rights** included in the convention.


These are all based on what children need to survive, grow, participate and reach their potential!


Articles 7 and 8 are the specific ones that talk about the right to identity and that the Government has to respect your right to your name, nationality and family.

Curated by Emma Hinton (The Light Library) and Lizzy Lockhart (Save the Children NZ), the poem weaves the voices of children into one shared expression: identity is our right to be ourselves.








## Extra wero (challenges):
